Hanging your artwork with the appropriate hardware is critical to being accepted by all gallery committees ...

One of the oldest and proven methods of picture hanging is the "screw eyelet" and picture wire technique.

Materials needed:

- A] Screw eyes or eyelets
- **B]** Braided picture wire
- C] D-rings and screws

Tools:

- a] Needle nose pliers
- b] Wire snips or scissors
- c} Awl or sharp nail
- d] Screw driver


1. Screw eyelets are installed on the back side rails of the frame (NEVER ON THE CANVAS FRAME AS GALLERY HANGING HOOKS CAN CUT INTO YOUR ARTWORK).

2. Measure down usually at one third or (one quarter for taller pieces) down on each side, making sure each side are equal.


3. Punch a small hole to prepare the wood for accepting the eyelet A or D ring screw for heavy duty artwork, used with a screw, the combination can be more suitable. Using a sharp awl as it is best for avoiding splitting the wood.

4. The wire should always be of the braided and of a gauge that can handle the specific weight of your artwork and frame.


5. Wire can be either stretched moderately tight or with enough slack so that the apex of the wire is halfway between the eyelets or D-rings and the top of your frame.




A eyelets
